7. President Frank's daughter will be attending East Carolina University (ECU) this fall, majoring in Criminal Justice. Frank will most likely be her first case.
8. President Frank's mother-in-law, Mary, is not doing well. She's in an assisted living facility. We all wish her the best.

1. **OLD BUSINESS:**

1. **Italian Earthquake Relief:** President Frank recapped the discussion and motions that were made and approved at the last board meeting on this subject. Tony Aiello had sent an email to Frank requesting that TIAHA simply collect a sum of money, then send the money through appropriate channels to reach the earthquake victims. Bob Vetrano made a motion that TIAHA donate a sum of money to the earthquake relief (without holding a fund raising event), but the board should vote on the amount to donate after the Raleigh International Festival. Bob felt we need to check TIAHA's financial health after the International Festival before deciding how much to donate. The motion was seconded by Capi. John Bono made a motion that the board tables all discussion about making a donation to earthquake relief until after the International Festival. Jim Frederici seconded the motion. Both motions were approved by the board.

2. **Durham Bulls Game for Oxford Orphanage Kids:** This is an annual event chaired by John Bono. This event allows several of the children from the Oxford Orphanage to attend a Durham Bulls game at TIAHA's expense, with TIAHA members and their families. Tony Aiello's company, Humana, is sponsoring the ball game tickets. The game is tomorrow evening in Durham, Thursday, August 20th. As of this meeting there are 2 remaining tickets available for TIAHA members and their families. **John Bono and Tony Aiello were both thanked for doing an outstanding job with this event.**
3. **Next Adopt-A-Highway Cleanup:** President Frank, speaking for the Adopt-A-Highway Chairman, Mark Aliano stated the next highway clean session will be on Saturday, August 29th at 8:30am. Members are asked to meet at the usual location, Brassfield Elementary School near the intersection of Brassfield and Honeycutt Roads in north Raleigh. Mark's wife, Kathine, usually cooks breakfast for the volunteers, which is great.
4. **P.O. Box Rent:** John Bono reported that he was able to secure our old P.O. Box and he was able to pay the rent on the box, and he obtained additional keys to the box for board members to have. John Bono was named the new unofficial mailbox chairman of the new unofficial mailbox committee consisting of, John Bono. Thank you, John.
5. **Cary Lazy Days:** Bob Vetrano said TIAHA has withdrawn from the Lazy Days event due to logistical problems. Bob said the logistics are tougher to handle than those for the International Festival. Lazy Days organizers would only provide one 20 amp electrical service to the TIAHA tent. That's not enough for two fryers and a small refrigerator. Everything would have to be kept cold in coolers. That's not acceptable, nor easy to do. Bob will work at the Knights of Columbus booth at Lazy Days to learn from the Knights to see how they handle the logistics for the event. Bob received a refund of TIAHA's \$250.00 entry fee.
6. **News Letter:** Neal Caliendo, our newsletter editor, will handle all of the manual labor that's involved with mailing hard copies of the TIAHA newsletters via Snail Mail to the members who don't have email capability. THANK YOU , NEAL!! Neal said there are 19 TIAHA members who receive their monthly newsletters via the U.S. mail. At the last board meeting, Jim Frederici made a motion that Neal Caliendo should receive his annual TIAHA dues for free for doing an outstanding job as newsletter editor for the past several years, and for continuing on as editor. The newsletter requires a very large amount of work each month. The motion was seconded by both Vince Salvaggio and Bob Vetrano at the board meeting. The motion was approved by the board.
7. **St. Raphael's Festival, September 11th and 12th :** President Frank reported that plans are well under way for TIAHA's involvement in the annual at St. Raph's Festival. Frank reported this year's festival will be a cash-less event. People attending will purchase tickets from a central location, then use the tickets to purchase food, drinks and other items. Frank reported that TIAHA would again have both a food booth and have the "Refuse Consolidation and Removal" contract. Frank placed sign-up sheets on a table near the door for volunteers to sign up. The festival is on Friday and Saturday, September 11th and 12th, with clean up on Sunday the 13th. The gates open at 4:00pm on Friday and Noon on Saturday. Carmine DiGrande raised the possibility off adding Italian rice balls to the menu at TIAHA's food booth. There was a brief discussion, with the subject to be taken offline after the meeting was adjourned.
8. **P.R Chairman:** Vice President, Sal Notarmaso, asked the question, "Who is the P.R. chairman for TIAHA?" The answer is: John Bono is the TIAHA P.R. chairman. As a result of his asking the question, Sal "No Tomatoes" was named the new unofficial assistant to the P.R. chairman of the new unofficial P.R. committee consisting of John Bono and Sal. Events where TIAHA should be getting some P.R. via the News & Disturber or on local TV are: Taking the Oxford orphans to the Durham Bulls game, and TIAHA's involvement in other charity events (such as serving meal to our troops at the USO club), and TIAHA's participation in the Raleigh International Festival and St. Raphael's Festival.
9. **TIAHA Family Picnic:** President Frank had not yet received a contract from the Oddfellows Lodge for rental of the facility for TIAHA's family picnic. The date for the picnic is September 20th, starting at 1:00pm. TIAHA provides the main dish of hamburgers and hotdogs and Italian sausages all grilled to your liking, along with drinks. Everyone attending is asked to bring a dish to pass, based on the starting letter of your last name. Carmine DiGrande and Bob Vetrano suggested that some of the older members who may not be able to drive any longer, should be contacted, and rides arranged for them with TIAHA members who are attending.

- **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. **From TIAHA's Heritage Chairman:** Tony Aiello has taken on the task of being the TIAHA Heritage Chairman. Tony gave a brief introduction to a short video about traveling around in Italy. It was an interesting video, and as always the scenery was breath taking.
2. President Frank told everyone in attendance about an upcoming Mass in Italian to be held at St. Joseph's Catholic church on Wednesday, September 23rd. Please see the news letter for details.
3. **Jack Giamportone Investment Options:** President Frank recapped for the general membership the invitation by Capi to Jack Giamportone, who attended the last board meeting to present some options for investing the money TIAHA currently has tied up in Certificates of Deposit. Jack discussed with the board a couple options available for moving the money from CD's into other investment vehicles. They'd be low to medium risk investments. Nothing can be done until Jack can see the current bank statements for the CD's to know how much money there is, and when the CD's are scheduled to automatically renew. The board thanked Jack for attending the meeting and providing his financial wisdom.
4. **Raleigh Sidewalk Painting Festival:** Victor Cononi spoke about this event, and the possibility of TIAHA's involvement. This festival is held the weekend of September 19th and 20th in downtown Raleigh on Fayetteville Street. The street is closed to traffic. About 10,000 people attend over a 2-day period. The festival hours are 10am – 10pm. Since TIAHA is pulling out of the Lazy Days in Cary, the \$250.00 Lazy Days entrance fee could be used to set up a grill on the sidewalk outside of Sarah Parker's art shop. TIAHA could cook and sell simple sausage and pepper subs. No electricity required for a charcoal grill. Victor Cononi has discussed this with Sarah Parker and gained her approval. For vegetarians, TIAHA could also sell eggplant parm subs. Victor said he needs a co-chairman to work with him.
5. **International Festival:** President Frank said there would be another planning meeting for the International Festival in 2 – 3 weeks. This year's festival will run for 3 days, which means the Wake County Health Inspectors will be involved. The dates for the festival are October 2nd, 3rd and 4th. As always, we will need many, many volunteers to help with prep work, cooking, selling and taking everything apart. This year's theme is "Language". (this does not include Italian hand gestures). The local Sons of Ital Lodge will at the festival this year with a booth in the bazaar area.
6. **Senior Olympics:** John Colombo stood to say a few words before the meeting adjourned. John wanted to thank Humana (the company that Tony Aiello works for) for sponsoring the Senior Olympics in California. John's wife, Mary, was on one of the teams from Raleigh who won a gold medal in the Senior Olympics. Congratulations to Mary Colombo!!

1. We all had another outstanding meal this evening!! Two new members to TIAHA cooked this evening: Ryan Toni and James Barone, with some minor assistance from Carmine DiGrande. Maria Montessori

Maria Montessori was born in [Chiaravalle \(Ancona\)](#), Italy to Alessandro Montessori, and Renilde Stoppani (niece of [Antonio Stoppani](#)). At the age of thirteen she attended an all-boy technical school in preparation for her dreams of becoming an engineer. Montessori was the first woman to graduate from the University of Rome La Sapienza Medical School, becoming the first female doctor in Italy. She was a member of the University's Psychiatric Clinic and became intrigued with trying to educate the "special needs or "unhappy little ones" and the "uneducatable" in Rome. In 1896, she gave a lecture at the Educational Congress in Torino about the training of the disabled. The Italian Minister of Education was in attendance, and was impressed by her arguments sufficiently to appoint her the same year as director of the Scuola Ortofrenica, an institution devoted to the care and education of the mentally retarded. She accepted, in order to put her theories to proof. Her first notable success was to have several of her 8 year old students apply to take the State examinations for reading and writing. The "defective" children not only passed, but had above-average scores, an achievement described as "the first Montessori miracle." Montessori's response to their success was "if mentally disabled children could be brought to the level of normal children then (she) wanted to study the potential of 'normal' children".

“Scientific observation has established that education is not what the teacher gives; education is a natural process spontaneously carried out by the human individual, and is acquired not by listening to words but by experiences upon the environment. The task of the teacher becomes that of preparing a series of motives of cultural activity, spread over a specially prepared environment, and then refraining from obtrusive interference. Human teachers can only help the great work that is being done, as servants help the master. Doing so, they will be witnesses to the unfolding of the human soul and to the rising of a New Man who will not be a victim of events, but will have the clarity of vision to direct and shape the future of human society”.

Because of her success with these children, she was asked to start a school for children in a housing project in Rome, which opened on January 6, 1907, and which she called "Casa dei Bambini" or Children's House. Children's House was a child care center in an apartment building in the poor neighborhood of Rome. She was focused on teaching the students ways to develop their own skills at a pace they set, which was a principle Montessori called "spontaneous self-development". A wide variety of special equipment of increasing complexity is used to help direct the interests of the child and hasten development. When a child is ready to learn new and more difficult tasks, the teacher guides the child's first endeavors in order to avoid wasted effort and the learning of wrong habits; otherwise the child learns alone. It has been reported that the Montessori method of teaching has enabled children to learn to read and write much more quickly and with greater facility than has otherwise been possible. The Montessori Method of teaching concentrates on quality rather than quantity. The success of this school sparked the opening of many more, and a worldwide interest in Montessori's methods of education.



After the 1907 establishment of Montessori's first school in Rome, by 1917 there was an intense interest in her method in North America, which later waned, in large part due to the publication of a small booklet entitled "The Montessori System Examined" by William Heard Kilpatrick - a follower of John Dewey. (Nancy McCormick Rambusch contributed to the revival of the method in America by establishing the [American Montessori Society](#) in 1960); at the same time Margaret Stephenson came to the US from Europe and began a long history of training Montessori teachers under the auspices of the Association Montessori Internationale (AMI). Montessori was exiled by Mussolini mostly because she refused to compromise her principles and make the children into soldiers. She moved to Spain and lived there until 1936 when the Spanish Civil War broke out. She then moved to the Netherlands until 1939.

In the year 1939, the Theosophical Society of India extended an invitation asking Maria Montessori to visit India. She accepted the invitation and reached India the very same year accompanied by her only son, Mario Montessori Sr. This heralded the beginning of her special relationship with India. She made the international Headquarters of the Theosophical Society at Adyar, Chennai, her home. However the war forced her to extend her stay in India. With the help of her son, Mario, she conducted sixteen batches of courses called the Indian Montessori Training Courses. These courses laid a strong foundation for the Montessori Movement in India. In 1949 when she left for The Netherlands she appointed Albert Max Joosten as her personal representative, and assigned him the responsibility of conducting the Indian Montessori Training Courses. Joosten along with Swamy S R, another disciple of Dr. Maria Montessori, continued the good work and ensured that the Montessori Movement in India was on a sound footing.

During a teachers conference in India she was interned by the authorities and lived there for the duration of the war. Montessori lived out the remainder of her life in the Netherlands, which now hosts the headquarters of the AMI, or [Association Montessori Internationale](#). She died in Noordwijk aan Zee. Her son Mario headed the AMI until his death in 1982.

Maria Montessori died in the Netherlands in 1952, after a lifetime devoted to the study of child development. Her early work centered on women's rights and social reform and evolved to encompass a totally innovative approach to education. Her success in Italy led to international recognition, and for over 40 years she traveled all over the world, lecturing, writing and establishing training programs. In later years, 'Educate for Peace' became a guiding principle, which underpinned her work.





Roman Miles and Milestones

Remember the famous quote, "All roads lead to Rome?" The Aurelia is the first of the major consular roads, followed by the Cassia, then the Flaminia, the Salaria, the Nomentana, the Tibertina, and the Appia.

The Appia, known then as The Appian Way, went from Rome to Puglia. The Aurelia went from Rome to France. The Cassia from Rome to Tuscany, the Flaminia from Rome to Rimini and the Salaria from Rome to the Adriatic Sea (in Le Marche).

The first network of this type of roads was set up by the Romans more than two thousand years ago to manage their provinces and to hinder the ability of the provinces to organize any resistance against their Empire. But a little more Roman trivia: The Roman Empire, in case you don't remember your history, lasted from 753 B C to the downfall of Rome, while Nero played his violin, in 476 A D. The Empire was founded by Romulus, the first of the seven Kings of Rome in 753BC, but the last king was named Tarquin the Proud (Tarquinius Superbus), who was deposed in 510BC when the Roman Republic was established.

Just a little more:

Every mile on every road was marked with a milestone to tell the distance to the center of this network: Rome. The markers still exist. But they are not what we would call miles.

Here's the difference, according to wikipedia.org:

Throughout history many units of length named mile have been used, with widely differing definitions, originating with the Roman mile of approximately 1479 meters. A Roman mile consisted of 1000 "double steps", or two strides by a Roman soldier. The Latin term for each such double stride is a passus having a length of 5 Roman feet or approximately 4.83 English feet. The word mile itself has been derived from the words mille passus (plural milia passuum), a thousand paces.

Along the roads built by the Romans throughout Europe, it was common to erect a stone every mile to announce the distance to Rome, the so-called milestones. The noun miliarium (plural miliaria), designating a milestone, was also used as a figurative alternative for mile.

The name statute mile goes back to Queen Elizabeth I of England who redefined the mile from 5000 feet to 8 furlongs (5280 feet) by statute in 1593.
