## TIAHA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

June 6th, 2009 at Knights of Columbus, New Hope Road and Columbus Road, Raleigh, NC

**Attendees:** Frank Ferraro, John Bono, Dale Mancuso, Victor Cononi, Jim Frederici, Sal Notarmaso, Vince Salvaggio.

**Meeting Called To Order:** 6:38pm at Bella Monica restaurant.

- **Board Meeting Was Also The Installation Dinner:**

1. There was to have been an installation dinner held in March to install the new board for 2009. That never happened for various reasons.
2. A decision was made to hold tonight's board meeting at restaurant Bella Monica and have the board meeting double as the long overdue installation dinner.
3. The new board was sworn in by taking the TIAHA oath of office. The board is now legal.
4. Disclaimer: If any information in these meeting minutes is incorrect, it's because Victor Cononi caused the waitress to spill wine on my paperwork, President Frank splattered red tomato sauce on my note pad, and your secretary may have had one too many glasses of wine to drink. I'm not entirely sure, but I might have.

- **New Member Voted In By Board:**

- a. The board unanimously voted in Ryan Toni as TIAHA's newest member. Congratulations, Ryan !!!

- **Raffle Tickets:**

1. Frank reported that to date only enough tickets and money have been turned in to cover the cost of the prizes being offered. This is not sufficient. TIAHA needs the money from the raffle tickets to operate throughout 2009.
2. Frank asked the board members to call the people on their CALL lists to find out if they've sold their tickets; and if so, to please turn in the money.

- **International Festival:**

1. President Frank reported that all paperwork for TIAHA's participation in the International Festival was to have been turned in by June 1<sup>st</sup>.
2. Frank said he'd received no notification from the International Festival organizers, either by phone or email or U.S. mail, about the June 1<sup>st</sup> deadline for the paperwork.
3. Frank contacted the lead organizer to tell him/her that TIAHA does fully intend to participate with both a food and cultural booth, as in the past. The paperwork will be submitted to the International Festival committee ASAP.
4. As in past years, President Frank will be the over all chairman of TIAHA's participation, with Bob Vetrano being the food chairman. A cultural booth chairman is needed.
5. The International Festival will be in the new Raleigh Convention Center again this year. The dates are October 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>.

- **Cary Lazy Days:**

1. Bob Vetrano sent out an email to the club asking for volunteers to help setup, work the booth and clean up after the event. As of this writing, Bob has had no one volunteer.
2. The board voted unanimously to pay the \$300.00 requested by Bob Vetrano for fees and food.
3. The board thinks the food menu for the Lazy Days needs to be thought over and reconsidered.

- **Italian Earthquake Relief:**

1. Victor Cononi met with Mario Longo, the owner of Vic's Italian Restaurant in downtown Raleigh.
2. Victor told the board that TIAHA would be allowed to use the restaurant's kitchen to cook any food TIAHA might serve at a First Friday event, where TIAHA could raise funds for earthquake relief, as well as for other of TIAHA's favorite charities.

- **Rental Storage Options (correction from previous board minutes of 5-05-2009):**

- **Your club secretary had the facts wrong.** Capi checked on the prices for different sizes of storage units at the rental storage facility next to the K of C.
- Capi was trying to determine whether or not TIAHA needs more storage space. Capi was checking on the costs for all sizes of storage lockers where TIAHA currently has storage rented. **Capi was**

**not checking on costs in order to down size the current storage space and save money, as your secretary erroneously reported in the previous board minutes.**

- Dale M. reported there are several items in the storage shed that should be removed and discarded. This would free up space in the current unit. Items include a fridge that doesn't work and a file cabinet.
  
- **St. Raph's Festival in September:**
  - As reported in previous meeting minutes, President Frank reported that organizational meetings have begun at St. Raphs for their September Festival.
  - Frank has begun attending their organizational meetings.
  - Frank reported that TIAHA would again have both a food booth and have the trash collection contract.

  - This event allows several of the children from the Oxford Orphanage to attend a Durham Bulls game at TIAHA's expense, with TIAHA members and their families.
  - As reported in the general membership meeting minutes from 5-20-2009, Tony Aiello said his company (Humana) will sponsor the ticket cost for the Oxford children. Thank you, Tony!!!
  
- **Knights of Columbus Golf Tournament To Support Special Olympics:**
  - This will be held on June 12<sup>th</sup>.
  - The cost will be \$60 per person.
  - There are no further details available as of this writing.
  
- **TIAHA Family Bowling Day:**
  - Vice President Sal "No Tomatoes" brought up the idea of having a TIAHA family bowling day.
  - All board members agreed this would be a good idea.
  - Sal will look into this and see what can be arranged.
  
- **TIAHA Scholarship:**
  - Victor Cononi reported he'd received an email from Bob Giannuzzi with the name of the scholarship winner for 2009.
  - Victor has validated the scoring for this competition.
  - The name of the winner was revealed to the board. Bob Giannuzzi was asking the board's permission to invite the winner and his/her family to the annual TIAHA family picnic where the award will be presented.
  - Your secretary is purposely withholding the winner's name from these meeting minutes, so President Frank and/or Bob Giannuzzi can have the honor of making the announcement at the June general membership meeting. (I don't want to steal their thunder).

All of TIAHA mourns Claudio's passing.
  2. Rudy DeFrancisci had cataract surgery. He's doing well.
  3. Al Cellini thanked members of TIAHA for their prayers and thoughts for his wife, Pat, who was ill, but has made a complete recovery. Pat Cellini has returned to work.
  4. Tony Aiello has two children who have both graduated from NC State University. Congratulations to both, and to Tony and Ginny, the happy parents. My apologies, but I don't have the names of Tony's children in my notes.
  5. Mark Aliano's father has been diagnosed with diabetes. One of his feet will have to be amputated. Our thoughts and prayers go out to Mark and his father, and to Mark's family.
  6. Peter Cari has beaten cancer !!! Way to go, Peter !!!
  7. Jersey Mike's daughter, Michelle, is getting married. Congratulations to Michelle.
  8. President Frank's daughter's boyfriend, Steve, needs a liver transplant.
  9. President Frank's mother-in-law, Mary, has pneumonia.
  10. Tom Berthiaume's daughter has had a breast reconstruction after breast removal due to breast cancer.
  
- 1. **OLD BUSINESS:**
  1. **Annual Raffle: Frank's message to the membership, "EVERYONE NEEDS TO SELL MORE TICKETS !!"** TIAHA did not hold its annual raffle last fall, which generally brings in a couple thousand dollars. This is one of the reasons TIAHA ended 2008 with a deficit. Frank has mailed or personally handed packets of tickets to all TIAHA members. Frank's message to the membership: SELL, SELL, SELL!!! Each member has been given 10 tickets to sell. Please return money from ticket sales to Frank, and pick up more tickets to sell. Cash prizes will be awarded this year instead of merchandise. The prizes will be \$500, \$300 and \$200.
  2. **USO Feed the Troops:** Dale Mancuso reported the last Feed the Troops event on April 21<sup>st</sup> was a success. The food was cooked at a restaurant named "An". Restaurant owner Michael Chuong allowed TIAHA to use his restaurant's kitchen. Approximately 50 – 60 of our brave men and women in uniform were served a hot pasta meal.   3. **Healing Place for Women:** Victor Cononi reported there are currently no events planned for or with The Healing Place for Women. The possibility of TIAHA cooking a graduation dinner for the staff and women of The Healing Place for Women has been put on hold.
  4. **Heritage Chairman:** Tony Aiello has been appointed to be the new Italian Heritage Chairman. TIAHA has not had an official heritage Chairman in several years. Good luck, Tony.

5. **TIAHA Scholarship:** Bob Giannuzzi reported a huge surge in applications since the April meeting, when at that time he hadn't yet received any applications. Bob reported a whopping THIRTEEN...count 'em.....13....applications have been received for the TIAHA scholarship. This year's scholarship will be \$1,000.00. Bob is currently waiting on scoring results of the written essays from several TIAHA members who were asked or volunteered to read and score the essays.

5. **Guy Caprioli's Hamburger Stand:** Guy Caprioli, son of our always accurate and honest club secretary, Capi, has a hamburger stand Friday evenings at locations where there are local, outdoor bands playing. Guy is looking for TIAHA members who might like to volunteer to work at his hamburger stand some Friday evenings selling hamburgers and listening to live music. It's generally only a 2-hour job, from about 6:30 – 8:30pm. Guy would like to have some TIAHA members volunteer to work, rather than him paying some strangers. Guy would then donate the proceeds from the hamburger sales to TIAHA to go toward the Italian earthquake relief effort. Contact Guy Caprioli if you're interested. 6. **Durham Bulls Game for Oxford Orphanage Kids:** This is an annual event chaired by John Bono. This event allows several of the children from the Oxford Orphanage to attend a Durham

Bulls game at TIAHA's expense, with TIAHA members and their families. TONY AIELLO STOOD UP AND SAID HIS COMPANY (HUMANA) WILL SPONSOR THE TICKET COST FOR THE OXFORD CHILDREN. WOW !!! THANK YOU, TONY, FOR THAT OFFER.

7. **Annual Italians vs. Irish Softball Game:** President Frank stated this event is in the planning stages. Frank is looking for players, but more importantly, Frank is looking for TIAHA members and their families to come out and cheer the TIAHA team onto victory over the barbarian Irish hoard.

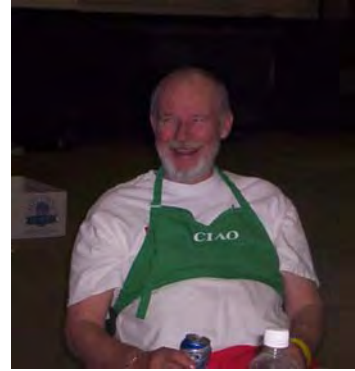

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## WE ALL NEED TO HELP CLEAN UP

One of the finest things about our club is the excellent meal we get to partake in each month. And for \$6 is a great deal

## The Stonesetters Who Built Duke University

July 16, 1990 marked the end of an era in the history of the construction of Duke University. On that date Louis Fara, a native of Frugarola, Italy, and the last of the original stone setters who skillfully laid the Indiana limestone trim on West Campus, died. Fara was representative of a group of laborers whose unique background and contribution will be acknowledged as long as eyes gaze upon Duke's majestic Gothic arches.

Documentation of these laborers' contributions is almost nonexistent. Photographs are extremely scarce, since construction took place during the Great Depression and laboring families did not frivolously spend hard-earned money on family snapshots. A few photographs have turned up, usually passport photos of younger men or pictures of much older men working on later commissions. Official university construction photos concentrate on architectural detail instead of the human element. The laborers' background and their sense of accomplishment have to be pieced together from scattered published interviews. Fortunately, their names are familiar, for many remained in Durham to raise their families. Six decades after the completion of West Campus the city telephone directory still lists the Italian names of Fara, Ribet, Ferettino, Citrini, and Berini. In addition, Giobbi and Greppi worked the stone as well as the highly respected stone workers Macadie and Brown. They worked along side native blacks and mountain whites who had also migrated to Durham in search of steady employment during severe economic times.

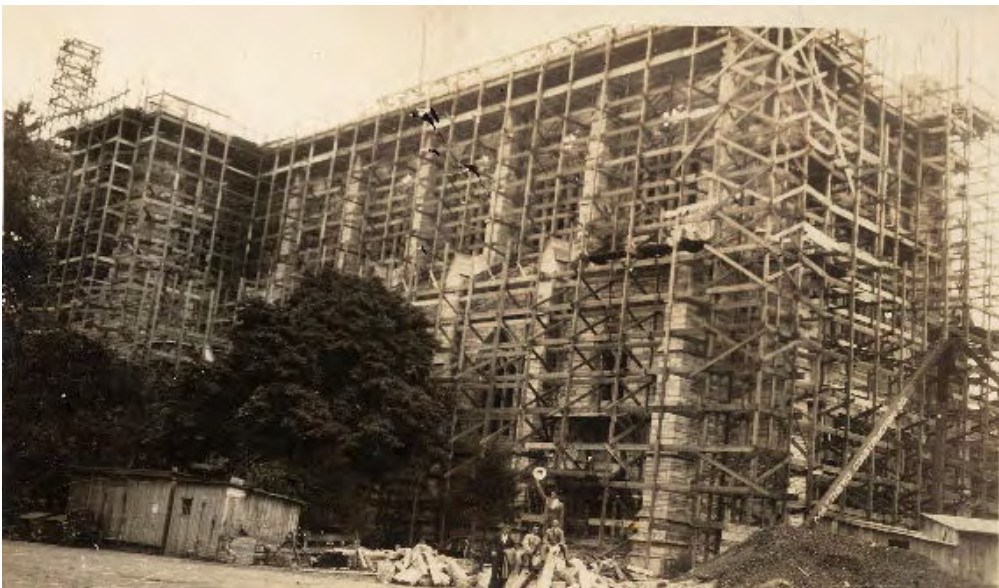
Each laborer became an accomplished artisan at his assigned level of work. Stonemasons worked the "rubble" bluestone from the nearby Hillsborough quarry. Often thought akin to brick layers, stonemasons did not believe the skills were interchangeable. Expert stonemasons had to have a feeling for color and design as well as the skill to size and shape each stone. These intangible and tangible qualities were vital to the West Campus project where the beauty of the stone was in its fourteen plus shades of color and where each piece was cut at a ratio of length two times height.

Only the very best men were selected for the more delicate work with "cutstone" or Indiana limestone. They were almost all Italians working for the subcontractor James W. Brown under the supervision of Donald Macadie. Brown and Macadie were natives of Scotland who immigrated to the United States early in the century and located in the south as a result of assigned commissions. The Italians, too, were most often immigrants who came to Duke as word circulated among friends and relatives that there was stone work in Durham, North Carolina. Many had been apprenticed in the Alps of Italy, Switzerland, or France, as had been Tony Berini, for a season's pay of "food, lodging, and a suit of clothes, pair of shoes and a bright red cap." In the United States, they were working in New York City or the coal mines of West Virginia before answering the call to Duke. The stone setters set the arches and doorways throughout the campus, capping their employment with the soaring nave of the Chapel. When the campus opened in September, 1930, a select crew remained to finish the Chapel. They were doubly proud because of the special recognition of their expertise and because they were completing such a magnificent structure. It was as if every stone setter, particularly those with European backgrounds, wanted to work on a Gothic cathedral in their lifetime. As the Duke commission finished many worked on nearby government building projects financed by the New Deal, and some traveled west to build tunnels on the Blue Ridge Parkway.

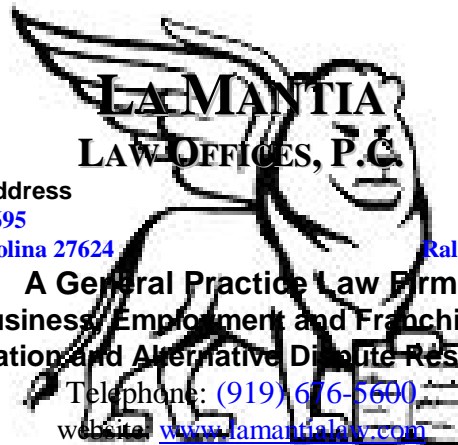
